4	The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:		
5	Section 1. Chapter 19A of the General Statutes is amended by adding a new		
6	Article to read:		
7	"ARTICLE 5.		
8	"Sterilization of Cats and Dogs Adopted from or Sold by Animal Shelters.		
9	" <u>§ 19A-51. Definitions.</u>		
10		context otherwise requires, the following definitions apply in this Article:	
11	<u>(1)</u>	'Animal Shelter' means a facility that is used to house animals and is	
12		owned and operated by a political subdivision of the State or by an	
13		organization devoted to the welfare, protection, and humane treatment

20	(a) No animal shelter may sell or permit the adoption of any cat or dog in its		
21	custody that has not been sterilized unless the shelter:		
22	(1)	Arranges for the sterilization of the cat or dog by a licensed	
23		veterinarian; or	

- (2) Enters into a written agreement with the person who purchases or adopts the cat or dog that provides that the purchaser or adopter shall take the cat or dog to a licensed veterinarian within a stipulated period of time, not to exceed seven days after the sale or adoption, to have the cat or dog examined and to schedule a specific time for the sterilization of the cat or dog. The animal shelter shall require from the purchaser or adopter a sterilization deposit sufficient to ensure that he obtains the sterilization. Upon certification by a licensed veterinarian that the sterilization has been performed, the sterilization deposit shall be paid to the veterinarian who performed the sterilization if he has not been compensated for his services. If the veterinarian has been partially compensated, the animal shelter shall pay the veterinarian to the extent that he has not been compensated. If the sterilization deposit or any part of it is not payable to a veterinarian following the sterilization, the purchaser or adopter is entitled to a refund of any unexpended amount.
- (b) If, within one week after the purchase or adoption, a licensed veterinarian determines that the cat or dog requires major medical treatment, the purchaser or adopter may elect to return the cat or dog and receive from the animal shelter another cat or dog or a refund of the sterilization deposit.
- (c) Unless the animal shelter has made arrangements with one or more local veterinarians to assume responsibility for the cost of sterilizing cats or dogs sold by or adopted from the shelter and the sterilization is performed by such a veterinarian, the person purchasing or adopting the cat or dog shall be responsible for the cost of the sterilization.
- (d) A person who fails within a reasonable time to arrange for the sterilization of an unsterilized cat or dog purchased or adopted from an animal shelter forfeits the sterilization fee and shall surrender the cat or dog to the animal shelter.

- (a) The failure of a purchaser or adopter under this Article to provide for the sterilization of an unsterilized cat or dog purchased or adopted from an animal shelter within a reasonable time after the purchase or adoption is an infraction as defined in G.S. 14-3.1.
- (b) The failure of a purchaser or adopter under this Article to surrender a cat or dog to the animal shelter in violation of G.S. 19A-52(d) is an infraction as defined in G.S. 14-3.1.

"§ 19A-54. Exception for reclaiming owners and institutions within this State registered under the Federal Animal Welfare Act.

This Article shall not apply to owners reclaiming their cats or dogs from animal shelters or to institutions to which animal shelters may sell cats and dogs under the provisions of G.S. 130A-192."

Sec. 2. This act shall become effective January 1, 1990.
