A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

AN ACT TO APPROPRIATE FUNDS TO THE DEPARTMENT OF HUMAN RESOURCES AND TO THE BOARD OF GOVERNORS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF NORTH CAROLINA FOR RESEARCH, DEVELOPMENT, AND IMPLEMENTATION OF VARIOUS ON-SITE WASTE TREATMENT PROJECTS, TO AID LOW INCOME PEOPLE IN OBTAINING REPAIRS TO SEPTIC TANKS, AND TO PROVIDE CONTINUING EDUCATION FOR SANITARIANS.

The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

Section 1. There is appropriated from the General Fund to the Department of Human Resources the sum of one million seven hundred fifty thousand three hundred twenty-seven dollars (\$1,750,327) for the 1989-90 fiscal year and the sum of one million nine hundred seventy-eight thousand nine hundred four dollars (\$1,978,904) for the 1990-91 fiscal year to provide research and development grants for on-site sewage projects, to provide grants-in-aid to counties to assist low income people to repair failing septic tanks, and to provide continuing education for sanitarians.

Sec. 2. There is appropriated from the General Fund to The Board of Governors of The University of North Carolina the sum of seven hundred twenty-five thousand one hundred dollars (\$725,100) for the 1989-90 fiscal year and the sum of seven hundred twenty-five thousand one hundred dollars (\$725,100) for the 1990-91 fiscal year to support expanded research and extension education and technical assistance for the development and implementation of better on-site waste, wastewater, septage, and sludge management systems.

1 Sec. 3. There is appropriated from the General Fund to The Board of
2 Governors of The University of North Carolina the sum of fifty-one thousand sixty-four
3 dollars (\$51,064) for the 1989-90 fiscal year and the sum of fifty-one thousand sixty-
4 four dollars (\$51,064) for the 1990-91 fiscal year to research and develop quantitative
5 methods to evaluate high water table soils for on-site waste treatment.

6 Sec. 4. This act shall become effective July 1, 1989.
