6	sand, gravel, ro	ck, concrete, or similar nonhazardous material may be used as fill and
7	need not be disp	osed of in a permitted landfill or solid waste disposal facility."
8	Sec. 2	. G.S. 130A-309.09(b) reads as rewritten:
9	"(b) Each	designated local government shall initiate a recyclable materials
10	recycling progra	m by 1 July 1991. Counties and municipalities are encouraged to form
11	cooperative arrangements for implementing recycling programs. The following	
12	requirements sha	all apply:
13	(1)	Construction and demolition debris must be separated from the solid
14		waste stream and segregated in separate locations at a solid waste
15		disposal facility or other permitted site. Demolition debris consisting
16		of used asphalt or used asphalt mixed with dirt, sand, gravel, rock,
17		concrete, or similar nonhazardous material may be used as fill and
18		need not be disposed of in a permitted landfill or solid waste disposal
19		<u>facility.</u>
20	(2)	At a minimum, a majority of marketable materials identified pursuant
21		to G.S. 130A-309.14(b) must be separated from the solid waste stream
22		prior to final disposal at a solid waste disposal facility and must be
23		offered for recycling if the separation and collection of these materials

1 2	is economically feasible and markets for such materials exist in such proximity as to make transportation of such materials to such markets
3	economically feasible.
4	(3) Units of local government are encouraged to separate all plastics,
5	metal, and all grades of paper for recycling prior to final disposal and
6	are further encouraged to recycle yard trash and other mechanically
7	treated solid waste into compost available for agricultural and other
8	acceptable uses."
9	Sec. 3. This act is effective upon ratification and expires 1 July 1993.
