A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

AN ACT TO LIMIT THE NUMBER OF HOURS AND THE TIME OF DAY THAT YOUTHS ENROLLED IN SCHOOL ARE ALLOWED TO WORK.

The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

Section 1. G.S. 95-25.5 reads as rewritten:

"§ 95-25.5. Youth employment.

(a) No youth under 18 years of age shall be employed by any employer in any occupation without a youth employment certificate unless specifically exempted. The Commissioner of Labor shall prescribe regulations for youths and employers concerning the issuance, maintenance and revocation of certificates. Certificates will be issued by county directors of social services, subject to review by the Department of Labor; provided, the Commissioner may by regulation require that the Department of Labor issue certificates for occupations with unusual or unique characteristics.

(a1) During the regular school term, no youth under 18 years of age who is enrolled in school in grade 12 or lower may be employed between 11 p.m. and 5 a.m. when there is school for the youth the next day. This restriction does not apply to youths 16 and 17 years of age if the employer receives written approval for the youth to work beyond the stated hours from the youth's parent or guardian and from the youth's principal or the principal's designee.

1 (b) No youth under 18 years of age may be employed by an employer in any
2 occupation which the United States Department of Labor shall find and by order declare
3 to be hazardous and without exemption under the Fair Labor Standards Act, or in any
4 occupation which the Commissioner of Labor after public hearing shall find and declare
5 to be detrimental to the health and well-being of youths.

6 (c) No youth 14 or 15 years of age may be employed by an employer in any
7 occupation except those determined by the United States Department of Labor to be
8 permitted occupations under the Fair Labor Standards Act; provided, such youths may
9 be employed by employers:

- 10 (1) No more than three hours on a day when school is in session for the
11 youth;
- 12 (2) No more than eight hours on a day when school is not in session for
13 the youth;
- 14 (3) Only between 7 A.M. and 7 P.M., except to 9 P.M. during the summer
15 (when school is not in session);
- 16 (4) No more than 40 hours in any one week when school is not in session
17 for the youth;
- 18 (5) No more than 18 hours in any one week when school is in session for
19 the youth; and
- 20 (6) Only outside school hours.

21 Notwithstanding the above, enrollees in high school apprenticeships or in work
22 experience and career exploration programs as defined under the Fair Labor Standards
23 Act may work up to 23 hours in any one week when school is in session, any portion of
24 which may be during school hours.

25 (d) No youth 13 years of age or less may be employed by an employer, except
26 youths 12 and 13 years of age may be employed outside school hours in the distribution
27 of newspapers to the consumer but not more than three hours per day. An employment
28 certificate shall not be required for any youth under 18 years of age engaged in the
29 distribution of newspapers to the consumer outside of school hours.

30 (e) No youth under 16 years of age shall be employed for more than five
31 consecutive hours without an interval of at least 30 minutes for rest. No period of less
32 than 30 minutes shall be deemed to interrupt a continuous period of work.

33 (f) For any youth 13 years of age or older, the Commissioner may waive any
34 provision of this section and authorize the issuance of an employment certificate when:

- 35 (1) He receives a letter from a social worker, court, probation officer,
36 county department of social services, a letter from the North Carolina
37 Alcohol Beverage Control Commission or school official stating those
38 factors which create a hardship situation and how the best interest of
39 the youth is served by allowing a waiver; and
- 40 (2) He determines that the health or safety of the youth would not be
41 adversely affected; and
- 42 (3) The parent, guardian, or other person standing **in loco parentis**
43 consents in writing to the proposed employment.

1 (g) Youths employed as models, or as actors or performers in motion pictures or
2 theatrical productions, or in radio or television productions are exempt from all
3 provisions of this section except the certificate requirements of subsection (a).

4 (h) Youths employed by an outdoor drama directly in production-related
5 positions such as stagehands, lighting, costumes, properties and special effects are
6 exempt from all provisions of this section except the certificate requirements of
7 subsection (a). Positions such as office workers, ticket takers, ushers and parking lot
8 attendants have no exemption and are subject to all provisions of this section.

9 (i) Youths under ~~16-18~~ years of age employed by their parents are exempt from
10 all provisions of this section, except the certificate requirements of subsection (a), the
11 prohibition from hazardous or detrimental occupations of subsection (b), and the
12 prohibitions of subsection (j).

13 (j) No person who holds any ABC permit issued pursuant to the provisions of
14 Chapter 18B of the General Statutes for the on-premises sale or consumption of
15 alcoholic beverages, including any mixed beverages, shall employ a youth:

16 (1) Under 16 years of age on the premises for any purpose;

17 (2) Under 18 years of age to prepare, serve, dispense or sell any alcoholic
18 beverages, including mixed beverages.

19 (k) Persons and establishments required to comply with or subject to regulation
20 of child labor under the Fair Labor Standards Act are exempt from all provisions of this
21 section, except the certificate requirements of subsection (a), the provisions of
22 subsection (a1), the prohibition from occupations found and declared to be detrimental
23 by the Commissioner of Labor pursuant to subsection (b), and the prohibitions of
24 subsection (j). In addition, employment certificates will not be issued if such person's
25 employment will be in violation of the applicable child labor provisions of the Fair
26 Labor Standards Act. Such employers may also be assessed civil penalties pursuant to
27 G.S. 95-25.23 for each violation of the provisions of this section or any regulation
28 issued hereunder from which there is no exemption.

29 (l) Notwithstanding any other provision of this section, any youth who holds a
30 North Carolina driver's license valid for the type of driving involved may be assigned as
31 part of his employment to drive an automobile or truck not exceeding 6,000 pounds
32 gross vehicle weight within a 25-mile radius of the principal place of employment,
33 provided that the youth has completed a State-approved driver-education course, and
34 provided that the assignment does not involve the towing of vehicles. 'Gross vehicle
35 weight' includes the truck chassis with lubricants, water and full tank or tanks of fuel,
36 plus the weight of the cab or driver's compartment, body and special chassis and body
37 equipment, and payload."
