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2	AN ACT TO CREATE AN EDUCATIONAL LEADERSHIP TASK FORCE TO
3	IDENTIFY HOW TO BEST SELECT, TRAIN, EVALUATE, ASSESS, AND
4	REGULATE THE STATE'S EDUCATIONAL LEADERS.

5 The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

6 Section 1. Establishment and Purpose. There is established the Educational 7 Leadership Task Force. The purpose of the Task Force is to identify how to best select, 8 train, assess, and regulate persons to become competent, motivated, and trusted 9 education leaders. The term "education leaders" includes superintendents, central office 10 program directors, principals, and assistant principals.

11 Sec. 2. Membership. The Task Force shall consist of 18 members. Task 12 Force members shall receive per diem, subsistence, and travel allowances in accordance 13 with G.S. 138-5, 138-6, or 120-3.1, as appropriate. Appointments to the Task Force 14 shall be made within 30 days of ratification of this legislation. Except as otherwise 15 provided, if a vacancy occurs in the membership, the appointing authority shall appoint 16 another person to serve for the balance of the unexpired term. Appointments shall be 17 made as follows:

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19 20 Two members of the State Board of Education appointed by the State Board chair. One of these two members shall be designated cochair of the Task Force by the State Board chair.

(2) Two members of the Board of Governors of The University of North
Carolina appointed by the chair of that board. One of these two
members shall be designated cochair of the Task Force by the chair of
the Board of Governors.

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1	(3)	Two Senate members appointed by the President Pro Tempore.
2	(4)	Two House members appointed by the Speaker of the House.
3	(5)	One dean of a school of education appointed by the President of The
4		University of North Carolina.
5	(6)	Two representatives, one from each of two professional schools, to be
6		appointed by the President of The University of North Carolina.
7		Professional schools may include schools of Business, Public
8		Administration, Law, or Medicine.
9	(7)	The State Superintendent of Public Instruction, or a designee
10		appointed by the Superintendent. The appointment shall remain for the
11		duration of the Task Force with the individual who is Superintendent
12		at the time of the creation of the Task Force.
13	(8)	The Teacher of the Year, chosen by the Department of Public
14	(0)	Instruction through its Teacher of the Year program. The appointment
15		shall remain for the duration of the Task Force with the individual who
16		is Teacher of the Year at the time of the creation of the Task Force. If
17		that person is unable to serve, a North Carolina teacher chosen by the
18		cochairs shall fill the vacancy.
19	(9)	The Principal of the Year, chosen by the Department of Public
20	(\mathcal{I})	Instruction through its Principal of the Year program. The appointment
21		shall remain for the duration of the Task Force with the individual who
22		is Principal of the Year at the time of the creation of the Task Force. If
23		that person is unable to serve, a North Carolina principal chosen by the
24		cochairs shall fill the vacancy.
25	(10)	The Superintendent of the Year, chosen by the North Carolina
26	(10)	Association of School Superintendents through its Superintendent of
27		the Year program. The appointment shall remain for the duration of
28		the Task Force with the individual who is the Superintendent of the
29		Year at the time of the creation of the Task Force. If that person is
30		unable to serve, a North Carolina superintendent chosen by the
31		cochairs shall fill the vacancy.
32	(11)	One member to represent business and industry appointed by the
33	(11)	Governor.
34	(12)	One local school board member appointed by the Chair of the State
35	(12)	Board.
36	(13)	One parent of a public school child appointed by the State
37	(15)	Superintendent of Public Instruction.
38	Sec. 3	. Cochairs. The cochairs shall belong to different political parties. The
39		ir and the chair of the Board of Governors shall consult to determine
40		hall appoint the cochair who belongs to the party to which the majority
41		ters belong and which of them shall appoint the cochair who belongs to
42	-	ch the largest minority of registered voters belong.
43	· ·	4. Staff. The Task Force cochairs may contract for professional,
44		sultant services. Facilitation of the work of the Task Force may be
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contracted to an individual who has an excellent national reputation in the area of 1 2 educational leadership and modern management principles. Professional and clerical 3 staff positions for the Task Force may be filled by persons whose services are loaned to the Task Force to fulfill the work of the Task Force. 4 5 Sec. 5. Space and Equipment. The General Administration of The 6 University of North Carolina shall provide meeting rooms, telephone, office space, 7 equipment, and supplies to the Task Force without charge. 8 Sec. 6. Duties, Issues for Study. The Task Force shall study issues related to 9 the training of education leaders, including superintendents, central office program 10 directors, principals, and assistant principals. Issues for study by the Task Force shall 11 include: 12 (1)Key characteristics of educational leadership, including the 13 knowledge, skills, and attitudes necessary to lead schools to high gains 14 in student learning; Entrance standards, methods to recruit and screen applicants, 15 (2)16 curriculum design, instructional delivery, and the quality controls 17 needed to continually improve educational leadership programs; 18 (3) Comprehensive strategies to restructure administrator preparation. The Task Force shall investigate varied methods of instructional delivery to 19 20 be used in educational leadership programs including collaborative, 21 interdisciplinary, and practice-based models, and use of the case 22 method: Incentives, including stipends and other methods, to attract the best 23 (4) 24 possible candidates to educational leadership programs; 25 (5) Methods to restructure university resources to assure cost efficiency and quality. Educational leadership programs provided by any 26 27 institution shall be of the highest priority to that institution; Collaborative roles of those contributing to educational leadership 28 (6) 29 training including: the universities, local school systems, the 30 Department of Public Instruction, the Principals Executive Program, business and industry, and the professional associations; 31 32 Consideration of certification, licensure, and other methods to regulate (7)33 the profession and to promote excellence in educational leadership. Credentials awarded should be based on performance which exhibits 34 35 knowledge of State programs, State standards, and effective leadership 36 skills: 37 Whether certification or licensing should be periodically reevaluated (8) 38 throughout an education leader's career; 39 (9) Use of assessment centers, evaluation panels, testing, and practicebased measures to evaluate the quality of practicing and potential 40 41 education leaders: 42 (10)Methods to maintain rigorous, high quality professional development that may continue throughout the education leader's career; 43

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1 2 3	(11) Hiring practices of local school administrative units and recommendations to encourage the identification and recruitment of quality candidates who demonstrate leadership potential. Active
4	recruitment of minorities and females;
5	(12) Developmental training and support for first year principals, assistant
6	principals, and superintendents; and
7	(13) Supply and demand trends for administrators over the next 10 years.
8	Sec. 7. Report. The Task Force shall make its final report and
9	recommendations to the Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee no later than
10	February 15, 1993, and shall terminate on that date.
11	Sec. 8. Upon the request of the Task Force, all State departments and
12	agencies, all local governments and their subdivisions, and all institutions approved to
13	train public school administrators shall furnish the Task Force with any information in
14	their possession or available to them.
15	Sec. 9. Of the funds appropriated to the Department of Public Education for
16	aid to local school administrative units for the 1992-93 fiscal year, up to the sum of
17	sixty thousand dollars (\$60,000) shall be used to conduct the work of the Task Force. Of
18	the funds appropriated to the Department of Public Instruction for the 1992-93 fiscal
19	year, up to the sum of sixty thousand dollars (\$60,000) shall be used to conduct the
20	work of the Task Force.
21	Sec. 10. This act becomes effective July 1, 1992.
