1	A BILL TO BE ENTITLED
2	AN ACT TO REVIVE THE CHARTER OF THE TOWN OF UNIONVILLE.
3	The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:
4	Section 1. Section 3 of Chapter 62 of the Private Laws of 1911 reads as
5	rewritten:
6	"Section 3. That the <u>elected officers of said-the</u> town shall consist of a mayor, <u>mayor</u>
7	and five commissioners, a constable, a secretary and treasurer, and the following persons
8	shall fill the offices until the regular election in May, one thousand nine hundred and eleven,
9	viz: Mayor, J. B. Little; commissioners, A. A. Secrest, T. L. A. Helms, J. T. Price, Dr. A. D. N.
10	Whitley and C. D. Benton, all of which offices shall be filled by election of popular vote, except
11	constable, secretary and treasurer, who shall be chosen by commissioners of said town. The
12	constable and treasurer shall give bond in such sum as the commissioners shall determine for the
13	faithful performance of the duties of their respective offices. November of 1999: Mayor, Larry
14	B. Simpson; commissioners, Kenneth J. Price, Jimmy Lee Baucom, Kenneth M. Brown,
15	Jr., Robert L. Crouch, and Randy Keith Baucom."
16	Section 2. Section 4 of Chapter 62 of the Private Laws of 1911 reads as
17	rewritten:

"Section 4. That officers and their successors shall be elected under the laws of chapter 1 2 seventy-three of The Revisal of one thousand nine hundred and five, relating to elections, 3 Chapter 160A and Chapter 163 of the General Statutes and shall hold their offices for the 4 four-year terms prescribed under the general law." 5 Section 3. Sections 5 and 6 of Chapter 62 of the Private Laws of 1911 are repealed. 6 7 Section 4. Section 7 of Chapter 62 of the Private Laws of 1911 reads as 8 rewritten: 9 "Section 7. Said commissioners shall have and are hereby vested with all the powers conferred upon commissioners of towns and cities and subject to the performance of all 10 the duties as such, conferred under the general laws. laws of chapter seventy-three of The 11 Revisal of one thousand nine hundred five." 12 13 Section 5. Chapter 62 of the Private Laws of 1911 is amended by adding a 14 new section to read: 15 Section 5.1. The Town of Unionville operates under the Mayor-Council Plan 16 as provided by Part 3 of Article 7 of Chapter 160A of the General Statutes. Section 5.2. Section 2 of Chapter 62 of the Private Laws of 1911 is rewritten 17 18 to read: 19 "Section 2. The boundaries of the Town of Unionville are as follows: 20 BEGINNING at the intersection of Friendly Baptist Church Road and Ridge Road; thence along and with Ridge Road in a generally southeast direction to the intersection of 21 22 Ridge Road and U.S. Highway 601; thence with U.S. Highway 601 in a generally southwest direction approximately 400 feet to the southwest corner of parcel 9-174-12B; 23 24 thence along and with the southern boundaries of the following properties: parcels 9-174-25 6G; 9-174-10; 9-174-6D; Country Ridge and Country Ridge, Sec. 2 as shown on plats recorded in Plat Cabinet B, Files 109A and 111A in the Office of the Union County 26 Register of Deeds; the minor subdivision of Kelly Helms and wife, Pauline Helms as 27 shown on plat recorded in Plat Cabinet B, File 343A in the Office of the Union County 28 29 Register of Deeds; thence with the eastern boundary of parcel 9-177-75 in a generally northerly direction to a point in the centerline of Baucom-Deese Road; thence with 30 Baucom-Deese Road in a generally easterly direction to the intersection of Baucom-31 Deese Road with Morgan Mill Road; thence with Morgan Mill Road in a generally 32 northeast direction to the intersection of Morgan Mill Road with Henry Baucom Road; 33 34 thence extending past said intersection and running with the centerline of said road approximately 701 feet; thence in a generally northwesterly direction with the line of 35 parcel 8-072-19 to said parcel's northernmost boundary line; thence with the 36 northernmost boundary lines of the following properties: 8-072-19, 8-072-25A, and 8-37 072-25; thence generally north with the property lines of parcel 8-072-9 to the 38 northernmost line of parcel 8-072-9; thence with the northernmost property lines of 39 parcels 9, 9A, and 8B; thence in a generally southerly direction along and with the 40 westernmost property lines of parcels 8-072-8B, 8-072-8D, and 8-072-8A to the 41 centerline of Henry Baucom Road; thence with the centerline of said Road in a generally 42 westerly direction to the intersection of Henry Baucom Road with Haigler-Baucom Road; 43

thence with Haigler-Baucom Road in a generally northwest direction to the intersection 1 2 of Haigler-Baucom Road with Sikes Mill Road; thence with Sikes Mill Road in a 3 generally northerly direction to the intersection of Sikes Mill Road with Clontz-Long 4 Road: thence in a generally westerly direction with Clontz-Long Road to the intersection 5 of Clontz-Long Road with U.S. Highway 601; thence with U.S. Highway 601 in a 6 generally southerly direction to the intersection of U.S. Highway 601 and Lawyers Road; thence with Lawyers Road in a generally westerly direction to the intersection of 7 8 Lawyers Road and Friendly Baptist church Road; thence along and with Friendly Baptist 9 Church Road to the point and place of the BEGINNING."

10 Section 6. (a) From and after the effective date of this act, the citizens and property in the Town of Unionville shall be subject to municipal taxes levied for the year 11 12 beginning July 1, 1998, and for that purpose the Town shall obtain from Union County a record of property in the area herein incorporated which was listed for taxes as of January 13 14 1, 1998; and the businesses in the Town shall be liable for privilege license tax from the 15 effective date of the privilege license tax ordinance.

(b) The Town may adopt a budget ordinance for fiscal year 1998-99 without 16 17 following the timetable in the Local Government Budget and Fiscal Control Act, but shall 18 follow the sequence of actions in the spirit of the act insofar as is practical. For fiscal year 1998-99, ad valorem taxes may be paid at par or face amount within 90 days of 19 20 adoption of the budget ordinance, and thereafter in accordance with the schedule in G.S. 21 105-360 as if the taxes had been due and payable on September 1, 1998.

Section 7. On the date of the general election in 1998, the Union County 22 23 Board of Elections shall conduct a special election for the purpose of submission to the 24 qualified voters of the area described in Chapter 62 of the Private Laws of 1911, the question of whether or not the charter of the Town shall be revived. 25

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Section 8. In the election, the question on the ballot shall be:

"[]FOR []AGAINST

REVIVAL OF THE CHARTER OF THE TOWN OF UNIONVILLE''.

29 Section 9. In the election, if a majority of the votes are cast "For the Revival of the Charter of the Town of Unionville", Sections 1 through 6 of this act become effective 30 on the date that the Union County Board of Elections certifies the results of the election. 31 32 Otherwise, Sections 1 through 6 of this act have no force and effect.

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Section 10. This act is effective when it becomes law.

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
