SENATE BILL 915 RATIFIED BILL

AN ACT TO CREATE A TOBACCO RESERVE FUND FOR TOBACCO PRODUCT MANUFACTURERS NOT PARTICIPATING IN THE MASTER SETTLEMENT AGREEMENT WITH THE STATE OF NORTH CAROLINA.

The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

Section 1. Chapter 66 of the General Statutes is amended by adding the following new Article to read:

"<u>ARTICLE 37.</u> "TOBACCO RESERVE FUND.

"<u>§ 66-290. Definitions.</u>

As used in this Article:

- (1) <u>'Adjusted for inflation' means increased in accordance with the formula for inflation adjustment set forth in Exhibit C to the Master Settlement Agreement.</u>
- (2) Affiliate' means a person who directly or indirectly owns or controls, is owned or controlled by, or is under common ownership or control with, another person. Solely for purposes of this definition, the terms 'owns,' 'is owned,' and 'ownership' mean ownership of an equity interest, or the equivalent thereof, of ten percent (10%) or more, and the term 'person' means an individual, partnership, committee, association, corporation, or any other organization or group of persons.
- (3) 'Allocable share' means Allocable Share as that term is defined in the Master Settlement Agreement.
- (4) 'Cigarette' means any product that contains nicotine, is intended to be burned or heated under ordinary conditions of use, and consists of or contains (i) any roll of tobacco wrapped in paper or in any substance not containing tobacco; or (ii) tobacco, in any form, that is functional in the product, which, because of its appearance, the type of tobacco used in the filler, or its packaging and labeling, is likely to be offered to, or purchased by, consumers as a cigarette; or (iii) any roll of tobacco wrapped in any substance containing tobacco which, because of its appearance, the type of tobacco used in the filler, or its packaging and labeling, is likely to be offered to, or purchased by, consumers as a cigarette described in clause (i) of this definition. The term 'cigarette' includes 'roll-your-own' (i.e., any tobacco which, because of its appearance, type, packaging, or labeling is suitable for use and likely to be offered to, or purchased by, consumers as tobacco for making cigarettes). For purposes of this definition of 'cigarette,' 0.09 ounces of 'roll-your-own' tobacco shall constitute one individual 'cigarette.' 'Master Settlement Agreement' means the settlement agreement (and
- (5) <u>'Master Settlement Agreement' means the settlement agreement (and related documents) entered into on November 23, 1998, by the State and leading United States tobacco product manufacturers.</u>
- (6) 'Qualified escrow fund' means an escrow arrangement with a federally or State chartered financial institution having no affiliation with any tobacco product manufacturer and having assets of at least one billion

dollars (\$1,000,000,000) where such arrangement requires that such financial institution hold the escrowed funds' principal for the benefit of releasing parties and prohibits the tobacco product manufacturer placing the funds into escrow from using, accessing, or directing the use of the funds' principal except as consistent with G.S. 66-291(b).

- (7) <u>'Released claims' means Released Claims as that term is defined in the</u> <u>Master Settlement Agreement.</u>
- (8) <u>'Releasing parties' means Releasing Parties as that term is defined in the Master Settlement Agreement.</u>
- (9) <u>'Tobacco Product Manufacturer' means an entity that after the effective</u> date of this Article directly (and not exclusively through any affiliate):
 - <u>a.</u> Manufactures cigarettes anywhere that such manufacturer intends to be sold in the United States, including cigarettes intended to be sold in the United States through an importer (except where such importer is an original participating manufacturer, as that term is defined in the Master Settlement Agreement, that will be responsible for the payments under the Master Settlement Agreement with respect to such cigarettes as a result of the provisions of subsection II(mm) of the Master Settlement Agreement and that pays the taxes specified in subsection II(z) of the Master Settlement Agreement, and provided that the manufacturer of such cigarettes does not market or advertise such cigarettes in the United States);
 <u>b.</u> Is the first purchaser anywhere for resale in the United States of
 - b. Is the first purchaser anywhere for resale in the United States of cigarettes manufactured anywhere that the manufacturer does not intend to be sold in the United States; or
 - <u>c.</u> <u>Becomes a successor of an entity described in sub-subdivision</u> <u>a. or b. of this subdivision</u>.

The term 'Tobacco Product Manufacturer' shall not include an affiliate of a tobacco product manufacturer unless such affiliate itself falls within any of sub-subdivisions a. through c. of this subdivision.

(10) 'Units sold' means the number of individual cigarettes sold in the State by the applicable tobacco product manufacturer (whether directly or through a distributor, retailer, or similar intermediary or intermediaries) during the year in question, as measured by excise taxes collected by the State on packs (or 'roll-your-own' tobacco containers). The Secretary of Revenue shall promulgate such rules as are necessary to ascertain the amount of State excise tax paid on the cigarettes of such tobacco product manufacturer for each year. In lieu of adopting rules, the Secretary of Revenue may issue bulletins or directives requiring taxpayers to submit to the Department of Revenue the information necessary to make the required determination under this subdivision.

"§ 66-291. Requirements.

(a) Any tobacco product manufacturer selling cigarettes to consumers within the State (whether directly or through a distributor, retailer, or similar intermediary or intermediaries) after the effective date of this Article shall do one of the following:

- (1) Become a participating manufacturer (as that term is defined in section II(jj) of the Master Settlement Agreement) and generally perform its financial obligations under the Master Settlement Agreement; or
- (2) Place into a qualified escrow fund by April 15 of the year following the year in question the following amounts (as such amounts are adjusted for inflation):
 a. 1999: \$.0094241 per unit sold after the effective date of this
 - a. <u>1999: \$.0094241 per unit sold after the effective date of this</u> <u>Article.</u>

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- 2000: \$.0104712 per unit sold. <u>b.</u>
- For each of 2001 and 2002: \$.0136125 per unit sold. For each of 2003 through 2006: \$.0167539 per unit sold. <u>c.</u> <u>d.</u>
- For each of 2007 and each year thereafter: \$.0188482 per unit e. sold.

(b) A tobacco product manufacturer that places funds into escrow pursuant to subdivision (2) of section (a) of this subsection shall receive the interest or other appreciation on such funds as earned. Such funds themselves shall be released from escrow only under the following circumstances:

- To pay a judgment or settlement on any released claim brought against (1)such tobacco product manufacturer by the State or any releasing party located or residing in the State. Funds shall be released from escrow under this subdivision (i) in the order in which they were placed into escrow and (ii) only to the extent and at the time necessary to make payments required under such judgment or settlement;
- (2)To the extent that a tobacco product manufacturer establishes that the amount it was required to place into escrow in a particular year was greater than the State's allocable share of the total payments that such manufacturer would have been required to make in that year under the Master Settlement Agreement (as determined pursuant to section IX(i)(2) of the Master Settlement Agreement, and before any of the adjustments or offsets described in section IX(i)(3) of that Agreement other than the Inflation Adjustment) had it been a participating manufacturer, the excess shall be released from escrow and revert back to such tobacco product manufacturer; or
- To the extent not released from escrow under subdivisions (1) or (2) of (3) this subsection, funds shall be released from escrow and revert back to such tobacco product manufacturer 25 years after the date on which they were placed into escrow.

Each tobacco product manufacturer that elects to place funds into escrow (c) pursuant to this section shall annually certify to the Attorney General that it is in compliance with this section. The Attorney General may bring a civil action on behalf of the State against any tobacco product manufacturer that fails to place into escrow the funds required under this section. Any tobacco product manufacturer that fails in any year to place into escrow the funds required under this section shall:

- (1)Be required within 15 days to place such funds into escrow as shall bring it into compliance with this section. The court, upon a finding of a violation of this subsection, may impose a civil penalty (the clear proceeds of which shall be paid to the Civil Penalty and Forfeiture Fund in accordance with G.S. 115C-457.2) in an amount not to exceed five percent (5%) of the amount improperly withheld from escrow per day of the violation and in a total amount not to exceed one hundred percent (100%) of the original amount improperly withheld from escrow;
- In the case of a knowing violation, be required within 15 days to place (2)such funds into escrow as shall bring it into compliance with this section. The court, upon a finding of a knowing violation of subdivision (2) of subsection (a) of this section, may impose a civil penalty (the clear proceeds of which shall be paid to the Civil Penalty and Forfeiture Fund in accordance with G.S. 115C-457.2) in an amount not to exceed fifteen percent (15%) of the amount improperly withheld from escrow per day of the violation and in a total amount not to exceed three hundred percent (300%) of the original amount improperly withheld from escrow; and

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(3) In the case of a second knowing violation, be prohibited from selling cigarettes to consumers within the State (whether directly or through a distributor, retailer, or similar intermediary) for a period not to exceed two years.

Each failure to make an annual deposit required under this section shall constitute a separate violation."

Section 2. Part 1 of Article 2A of Chapter 105 of the General Statutes is amended by adding the following new section to read:

"<u>§ 105-113.4B. Enforcement of Master Settlement Agreement Provisions.</u>

The Master Settlement Agreement between the states and the tobacco product manufacturers, incorporated by reference into the consent decree referred to in S.L. 1999-2, requires each state to diligently enforce Article 37 of Chapter 66 of the General Statutes. The Office of the Attorney General and the Secretary of Revenue shall perform the following responsibilities in enforcing Article 37:

- (1) The Office of the Attorney General must give to the Secretary of Revenue a list of the nonparticipating manufacturers under the Master Settlement Agreement and the brand names of the products of the nonparticipating manufacturers.
- (2) <u>The Office of the Attorney General must update the list provided under</u> <u>subdivision (1) of this section when a nonparticipating manufacturer</u> <u>becomes a participating manufacturer, another nonparticipating</u> <u>manufacturer is identified, or more brands or products of</u> nonparticipating manufacturers are identified.
- (3) The Secretary of Revenue must require the taxpayers of the tobacco excise tax to identify the amount of tobacco products of nonparticipating manufacturers sold by the taxpayers, and may impose this requirement as provided in G.S. 66-290(10).
- (4) The Secretary of Revenue must determine the amount of State tobacco excise taxes attributable to the products of nonparticipating manufacturers, based on the information provided by the taxpayers, and must report this information to the Office of the Attorney General."

Section 3. This act is effective when it becomes law.
