A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

AN ACT EXTENDING THE TERMS OF OFFICE FOR THE MAYOR AND TOWN
 COMMISSIONERS OF THE TOWN OF STOVALL AND STAGGERING THOSE
 TERMS.

5 The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

6 SECTION 1. Sections 2.2 and 2.3 of the Charter of the Town of Stovall,
7 being Chapter 596 of the 1979 Session Laws, reads as rewritten:

8 "Section 2.2. Board of Commissioners; Composition; Terms of Office. The Board of 9 Commissioners shall be composed of five members, each of whom shall be elected for 10 terms of two-four years in the manner provided by Article III of this Charter; provided, 11 they shall serve until their successors are elected and qualified.

12 "Section 2.3. Election of the Mayor; Term of Office; Duties. The Mayor shall be 13 elected directly by voters of the Town in the manner provided by Article III of this 14 Charter for a term of two-four years; provided, the Mayor shall serve until his successor is elected and qualified. The Mayor shall be the official head of the Town government 15 and shall preside at all meetings of the Board of Commissioners. He shall have the right 16 17 to vote only if there are equal numbers of votes in the affirmative and the negative on any matter before the Board. The Mayor shall exercise such powers and perform such 18 19 duties as presently are or hereafter may be conferred upon him by the General Statutes 20 of North Carolina, by this Charter, and by the ordinances of the Town."

SECTION 2. Sections 3.1 and 3.2 of the Charter of the Town of Stovall,
 being Chapter 596 of the 1979 Session Laws, reads as rewritten:

23 "Section 3.1. Regular Municipal Elections; Conduct and Method of Election. <u>Except</u> 24 <u>as provided in Section 3.2 of this Charter, Regular-regular</u> municipal elections shall be 25 held in the Town every two-four years in odd-numbered years and shall be conducted in 26 accordance with the uniform municipal election laws of North Carolina. The Mayor and 27 members of the Board of Commissioners shall be elected according to the nonpartisan 28 plurality method of election, as provided in G.S. 163-292.

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"Section 3.2. Election of the Board of Commissioners; Election of Mayor. At the 1 2 regular municipal election in 1979 and every two years thereafter, there shall be elected 3 a Mayor and five Commissioners to fill the seats of the Mayor and Commissioners 4 whose terms are then expiring. The Commissioners and Mayor shall be elected to four-5 year terms by the qualified voters of the entire Town, except as provided otherwise in 6 this section. In 2001, and quadrennially thereafter, a Mayor shall be elected to a fouryear term. In 2001, for the position of Commissioner, the two persons receiving the 7 8 highest numbers of votes shall be elected to four-year terms and the three persons receiving the next highest numbers of votes shall be elected to two-year terms. In 2003, 9 and quadrennially thereafter, three persons shall be elected to four-year terms. In 2005, 10 11 and quadrennially thereafter, two persons shall be elected to four-year terms." **SECTION 3.** This act is effective when it becomes law. 12
