A BILL TO BE ENTITLED
AN ACT PERMITTING PHYSICIANS TO NOTIFY THE

AN ACT PERMITTING PHYSICIANS TO NOTIFY THE PARENT OR GUARDIAN OF A MINOR AFTER TREATING THE MINOR FOR VENEREAL DISEASE, PREGNANCY, ABUSE OF CONTROLLED SUBSTANCES OR ALCOHOL, OR EMOTIONAL DISTURBANCE.

The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

SECTION 1. G.S. 90-21.4(b) reads as rewritten:

"(b) The physician shall not may notify a parent, legal guardian, person standing in loco parentis, or a legal custodian other than a parent when granted specific authority in a custody order to consent to medical or psychiatric treatment, without the permission of the minor, concerning the medical health services set out in G.S. 90-21.5(a),G.S. 90-21.5(a) after treating the minor, unless the situation notification would, in the opinion of the attending physician indicates that notification is essential tophysician, pose a serious risk to the life or physical health of the minor. If a parent, legal guardian[,]guardian, person standing in loco parentis, or a legal custodian other than a parent when granted specific authority in a custody order to consent to medical or psychiatric treatment contacts the physician concerning the treatment or medical services being provided to the minor, the physician may give information."

SECTION 2. This act becomes effective October 1, 2005.
