Sec. 2. The Department of Public Instruction shall have available for all local 1 2 school districts an updated Comprehensive Health Education curriculum in accordance 3 with this act by the beginning of the 1990-91 school year. All local school administrative districts shall have developed and shall begin implementing the 4 5 Comprehensive Health Education curriculum in accordance with this act by the 6 beginning of the 1991-92 school year. The State Board of Education, in fulfilling its duty under this act to review and approve local curricula, shall schedule its work in such 7 a way as to facilitate the meeting of the deadline for local school administrative units 8 9 established in this section.

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Sec. 3. This act shall be effective upon ratification.

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
