1	A BILL TO BE ENTITLED
2	AN ACT TO REGULATE THE PRACTICE OF DIETETICS/NUTRITION.
3	The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:
4	Section 1. The General Statutes are amended by adding a new Chapter to
5	read:
6	"CHAPTER 90D.
7	<u>''DIETETICS/NUTRITION.</u>
8	"§ 90D-1. Short title.
9	This Chapter shall be known as the Dietetics/Nutrition Practice Act.
10	" <u>§ 90D-2. Purpose.</u>
11	It is the purpose of this Chapter to safeguard the public health, safety and welfare
12	and to protect the public from being harmed by unqualified persons by providing for the
13	licensure and regulation of persons engaged in the practice of dietetics/nutrition and by
14	the establishment of educational standards for such persons.
15	"§ 90D-3. Definitions.
16	As used in this Chapter, unless the context otherwise requires, the term:
17	(1) <u>'Board' means the North Carolina Board of Dietetics/Nutrition.</u>
18	(2) <u>'Dietetics/nutrition' means the integration and application of principles</u>
19	derived from the science of nutrition, biochemistry, physiology, food,
20	management, and behavioral and social sciences to achieve and
21	maintain a healthy status. The primary function of dietetic/nutrition
22	practice is the provision of nutrition care services as herein defined.

1	(2)	"Licensed distition/nutritionist' means on individual licensed in good

15		vitamins.
16	"§ 90D-4. Crea	ation of Board.
17		North Carolina Board of Dietetics/Nutrition is created. The Board shall
18		n members as follows:
19	(1)	One member shall be a professional whose primary practice is clinical
20		dietetics/nutrition;
21	<u>(2)</u>	One member shall be a professional whose primary practice is
22		community or public health dietetics/nutrition;
23	<u>(3)</u>	One member shall be a professional whose primary practice is
24		consulting in dietetics/nutrition;
25	<u>(4)</u>	One member shall be a professional whose primary practice is in
26		management of food and/or nutritional services;

17 18	(b) <u>Of the members initially appointed, the professional member appointed by</u> the Governor, one of the professional members appointed by the General Assembly

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1	" <u>§ 90D-8. License requirements.</u>
2	Each applicant for a license as a licensed dietitian/nutritionist shall meet the
3	following requirements:
4	(1) Has submitted a completed application as required by the Board; and
5	(2) Has submitted any fees required by the Board; and
6	(3) Either:
7	a. <u>Has provided evidence of current registration as a Registered</u>
8	Dietitian by the Commission on Dietetic Registration; or
9	b. <u>1.</u> <u>Has received a minimum of a baccalaureate degree</u>
10	from a regionally accredited college or university with a
11	major course of study in human nutrition, food and
12	nutrition, dietetics, community nutrition, public health
13	nutrition, food systems management, or an equivalent

22	must have their academic degree(s) validated as
23	equivalent to a baccalaureate or masters degree conferred
24	by a regionally accredited college or university in the
25	United States; and
26	<u>2. Has completed a planned, continuous program in</u>
27	approved clinical practice of not less than 900 hours
28	under the supervision of a licensed dietitian/nutritionist
29	as approved by the Board; and
30	<u>3.</u> <u>Has passed an examination as defined by the Board.</u>
31	" <u>§ 90D-9. Notification of applicant following evaluation of application.</u>
32	After evaluation of the application and of any other evidence submitted, the Board
33	shall notify each applicant that the application and evidence submitted are satisfactory
34	and accepted or unsatisfactory and rejected. If rejected, the notice shall state the reasons
35	for the rejection.
36	" <u>§ 90D-10. Examinations.</u>
37	Competency examinations shall be administered at least twice each calendar year to
38	qualified applicants for licensing. The examinations may be administered by a national
39	testing service. The Board shall prescribe or develop the examinations which may
40	include an examination given by the Commission on Dietetic Registration of the
41	American Dietetic Association or any other examination approved by two-thirds vote of
42	the entire Board.
43	"§ 90D-11. Granting license without examination.

43 "§ 90D-11. Granting license without examination.

1	The Board may grant, upon application and payment of proper fees, a license
2	without examination to a person who at the time of application holds a valid license as a
3	licensed dietitian/nutritionist issued by another state or any political territory or
4	jurisdiction acceptable to the Board if in the Board's opinion the requirements for that
5	license are substantially the same as the requirements of this Chapter.
6	"§ 90D-12. Provisional licenses.
7	The Board may grant a provisional license for a period not exceeding 12 months to
8	any individual who has successfully completed the educational and clinical practice
9	requirements and has made application to take the examination required under G.S.
10	90D-8. A provisional license shall allow the individual to practice as a
11	dietitian/nutritionist under the supervision of a dietitian/nutritionist licensed in this State
12	and shall be valid until revoked by the Board.
13	"§ 90D-13. License as constituting property of Board; display requirement;
14	<u>renewal; inactive status.</u>
15	(a) A license issued by the Board is the property of the Board and must be
16	surrendered to the Board on demand.
17	(b) The licensee shall display the license certificate in the manner prescribed
18	by the Board.
19	(c) The licensee shall inform the Board of any change of his address.
20	(d) The license shall be reissued by the Board annually upon payment of a
21	renewal fee if the licensee is not in violation of this Chapter at the time of application
22	for renewal and if the applicant fulfills current requirements of continuing education as
23	established by the Board.
24	(e) Each person licensed under this Chapter is responsible for renewing his
25	license before the expiration date. The Board shall notify licensee of pending license
26	expiration at least 30 days in advance thereof.
27	(f) The Board may provide for the late renewal of a license upon the payment of
28	a late fee in accordance with G.S. 90D-15, but no such late fee renewal may be granted
29	more than five years after license expires.
30	(g) Under procedures and conditions established by the Board, a licensee may
31	request that his license be declared inactive. The licensee may apply for active status at
32	any time and upon meeting the conditions set by the Board shall be declared in active
33	status.

35	(a) The Board may deny or refuse to renew a license, may suspend or revoke a
36	license, or may impose probationary conditions on a license if the licensee or applicant

28		she must be licensed.
29	<u>(6)</u>	A person who does not hold himself out to be a dietitian or nutritionist
30		when such person furnishes general nutrition information on food,
31		food materials, or dietary supplements; and this Chapter does not
32		prevent any such person from engaging in the explanation to
33		customers about foods or food products in connection with the
34		marketing and distribution of those products.
35	<u>(7)</u>	A person who provides weight control services; provided the program
36		has been reviewed by, consultation is available from, and no program
37		change can be initiated without prior approval of:
