PUBLIC SO LIFE EDU REPRODUC The General Ass Section "(e) School	A BILL TO BE ENTITLED MANDATE COMPREHENSIVE HEALTH EDUCATION IN THE CHOOLS AND TO INCLUDE IN THAT CURRICULUM FAMILY ICATION, PREGNANCY PREVENTION EDUCATION, AND CTIVE HEALTH EDUCATION. Sembly of North Carolina enacts: on 1. G.S. 115C-81(e) reads as rewritten: 1 Health Education Program—Comprehensive Health Education Program to and Administered.— A comprehensive school health education—comprehensive health education—program shall be developed and taught to pupils of the public schools of this State from kindergarten through ninth—twelfth grade. This program shall be developed over a 10-year period beginning July 1, 1978. As used above, "comprehensive school health" comprehensive health education' means health education in a school setting that is planned and carried out with the purpose of maintaining, reinforcing, or enhancing the health, health-related skills, and health attitudes and practices of children and youth that are conducive to their good health and that promote wellness, health maintenance, and disease prevention. It includes age-appropriate, sequential instruction in health either as part of existing courses or as a special course. It includes the subject matter of mental and emotional health, drug and

Sec. 2. Effective when the components of the standard course of study have been fully incorporated and implemented as a part of the Basic Education Program, G.S. 115C-81(e) reads as rewritten:

- "(e) School Health Education Program Comprehensive Health Education Program to Be Developed and Administered.
 - (1) A <u>comprehensive school health education comprehensive health</u> <u>education program</u> shall be developed and taught to pupils of the public schools of this State from kindergarten through <u>ninth twelfth</u> grade.

The State Board of Education shall designate an impartial panel to review education program plans submitted by local administrative units. Based on the panel's evaluation of the plans, the State Board of Education shall allocate the State-funded school health coordinators. Where feasible, a school health coordinator shall serve more than one local school administrative unit.

Each person initially employed as a State-funded school health coordinator after June 30, 1987, shall have a degree in health education.

(5) The Department of Public Instruction shall supervise the development and operation of a statewide comprehensive school-health education program including curriculum development, the establishment and monitoring of expectations, goals, and outcomes, in-service training provision and promotion of collegiate training, learning material review, and assessment and evaluation of local programs in the same manner as for other programs. - 1 (6) A State School Comprehensive Health Advisory Committee is hereby established.
 - a. Sec. 3. The Department of Public Instruction shall have available for all local school administrative units an updated Comprehensive Health Education curriculum in accordance with this act by the beginning of the 1990-91 school year. All local school administrative units shall have developed and shall begin implementing the Comprehensive Health Education curriculum in accordance with this act by the beginning of the 1991-92 school year. The State Board of Education, in fulfilling its duty under this act to review and approve local curricula, shall schedule its work in such a way as to facilitate the meeting of the deadline for local school administrative units established in this section.

Sec. 4. Except as otherwise provided, this act is effective upon ratification.
