Technical Considerations/Comments

There is no immediate fiscal impact identified in HB 70. However, if the Division is required to do more than what is currently outlined in the bill, then significant additional costs would be required. For example, if the Division had to provide for access, utilization, and maintenance of a broad range of information held in other agencies, this would require time and resources. This costs can not be determined at the present time.

In Chapter 289, of the 1987 Session Laws the Department of Human Resources, Division of Aging was required to put together a comprehensive agency policy plan for consideration and review by the General Assembly. The plan was presented to the Joint Legislative Commission on Governmental Operations, the Gerontology Commission, and the Commission on Aging; and included demographic, geographic, health, social, economic, and other important indicators. There were no additional funds provided by the General Assembly for all of the work that was required in putting that plan together. Therefore, it is not anticipated that any additional costs will be necessary to implement the bill in its present form.
