Technical Considerations/Comments

Passage of Senate Bill 512 will have no cost impact to the state or to local governments. However, failure to enact section 65 of the bill could endanger the collection of \$1.76 million in taxes on fire insurance premiums that are deposited into the Firemen's Relief Fund. One major insurer has challenged the department's ability to collect this tax and has withheld \$45,500 in tax payments for 1987. The company claims that it is not a fire insurance company as defined in G.S. 118-1 and is not subject to the tax. According to the Department of Insurance, none of the 501 insurers in the state that write fire and lightning insurance coverage are fire insurance companies. However, these companies have been subject to this tax since 1907. Senate Bill 512 would clarify who should pay this tax and would preserve the Firemen's Relief Fund.

Sections 1 through 64 of the bill were also reviewed and were found to have no fiscal impact.

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
