G.S. 18B-304(b) reads as rewritten: 1 2 "(b) **Prima Facie** Evidence. – Possession of the following amounts of alcoholic 3 beverages, without a permit authorizing that possession, shall be **prima facie** evidence that the possessor is possessing those alcoholic beverages for sale: 4 5 More than 80 liters of malt beverages, other than draft malt beverages (1) 6 in kegs: 7 (2) More than five-eight liters of spirituous liquor; or 8 (3) Any amount of nontaxpaid alcoholic beverages." 9 Sec. 4. G.S. 18B-401(b) reads as rewritten: 10 Taxis. – It shall be unlawful for a person operating a for-hire passenger vehicle as defined in G.S. 20-4.01(27)b, to transport fortified wine or spirituous liquor 11 12 unless the vehicle is transporting a paying passenger who owns the alcoholic beverage 13 being transported. Not more than five-eight liters of fortified wine or spirituous liquor, 14 or combination of the two, may be transported by each passenger. A violation of this 15 subsection shall not be grounds for suspension of the driver's license for illegal transportation of intoxicating liquors under G.S. 20-16(a)(8)." 16 17 Sec. 5. G.S. 18B-1001 reads as rewritten: 18 "§ 18B-1001. Kinds of ABC permits; places eligible. When the issuance of the permit is lawful in the jurisdiction in which the premises is 19 located, the Commission may issue the following kinds of permits: 20 21 (1) On-Premises Malt Beverage Permit. – An on-premises malt beverage 22 permit authorizes the retail sale of malt beverages for consumption on the premises and the retail sale of malt beverages in the manufacturer's 23 24 original container for consumption off the premises. The permit may 25 be issued for any of the following: Restaurants: 26 a. 27 Hotels; b. 28 c. Eating establishments; 29 Food businesses; d. 30 Retail businesses: e. f. 31 Private clubs; 32 g. Convention centers: Community theatres. 33 The permit may also be issued to certain breweries as authorized by 34 35 G.S. 18B-1104(7). Off-Premises Malt Beverage Permit. – An off-premises malt beverage 36 (2) permit authorizes the retail sale of malt beverages in the 37 manufacturer's original container for consumption off the premises. 38 39 The permit may be issued for any of the following: Restaurants: 40 a. 41 b. Hotels:

Food businesses:

Retail businesses.

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On-Premises Unfortified Wine Permit. – An on-premises unfortified (3) 1 2 wine permit authorizes the retail sale of unfortified wine for 3 consumption on the premises, either alone or mixed with other beverages, and the retail sale of unfortified wine in the manufacturer's 4 5 original container for consumption off the premises. The permit may 6 be issued for any of the following: 7 Restaurants; a. 8 b. Hotels: 9 Eating establishments: c. 10 d. Private clubs: Convention centers: 11 e. 12 f. Cooking schools: 13 Community theatres[;] g. 14 h. Winery. 15 (4) Off-Premises Unfortified Wine Permit. – An off-premises unfortified 16 wine permit authorizes the retail sale of unfortified wine in the 17 manufacturer's original container for consumption off the premises. 18 The permit may be issued for retail businesses. The permit may also 19 be issued for a winery for sale of its own unfortified wine. 20 On-Premises Fortified Wine Permit. – An on-premises fortified wine (5) 21 permit authorizes the retail sale of fortified wine for consumption on 22 the premises, either alone or mixed with other beverages, and the retail sale of fortified wine in the manufacturer's original container for 23 24 consumption off the premises. The permit may be issued for any of 25 the following: Restaurants: 26 a. 27 Hotels: b. Private clubs; 28 c. Community theatres[;] 29 d. 30 Wineries: e. 31 Convention centers. 32 Off-Premises Fortified Wine Permit. – An off-premises fortified wine (6) permit shall authorize the retail sale of fortified wine in the 33 34 manufacturer's original container for consumption off the premises. 35 The permit may be issued for food businesses. The permit may also be issued for a winery for sale of its own fortified wine. 36 Brown-Bagging Permit. – A brown-bagging permit authorizes each 37 **(7)** individual patron of an establishment, with the permission of the 38 39 permittee, to bring up to five eight liters of fortified wine or spirituous liquor, or five-eight liters of the two combined, onto the premises and 40 to consume those alcoholic beverages on the premises. The permit 41 42 may be issued for any of the following: Restaurants; 43 a.

Hotels:

3		e. Congressionally-chartered veterans organizations.
4	(8)	Special Occasion Permit. – A special occasion permit authorizes the
5		host of a reception, party or other special occasion, with the permission
6		of the permittee, to bring fortified wine and spirituous liquor onto the
7		premises of the business and to serve the same to his guests. The
8		permit may be issued for any of the following:
9		a. Restaurants;
10		b. Hotels;
11		c. Eating establishments;
12		d. Private clubs;
13		e. Convention centers.
14	(9)	Limited Special Occasion Permit. – A limited special occasion permit
15	. ,	authorizes the permittee to bring fortified wine and spirituous liquor
16		onto the premises of a business, with the permission of the owner of
17		that property, and to serve those alcoholic beverages to the permittee's
18		guests at a reception, party, or other special occasion being held there.
19		The permit may be issued to any individual other than the owner or
20		possessor of the premises. An applicant for a limited special occasion
21		permit shall have the written permission of the owner or possessor of
22		the property on which the special occasion is to be held.
23	(10)	Mixed Beverages Permit. – A mixed beverages permit authorizes the
24	` ′	retail sale of mixed beverages for consumption on the premises. The
25		permit also authorizes a mixed beverages permittee to obtain a
26		purchase-transportation permit under G.S. 18B-403 and 18B-404, and
27		to use for culinary purposes spirituous liquor lawfully purchased for
28		use in mixed beverages. The permit may be issued for any of the
29		following:
30		a. Restaurants;
31		b. Hotels;
32		c. Private clubs;
33		d. Convention centers;
34		e. Community theatres;
35		f. Nonprofit and political organizations.
36	(11)	Culinary Permit. – A culinary permit authorizes a permittee to possess
37		up to 12 liters of either fortified wine or spirituous liquor, or 12 liters
38		of the two combined, in the kitchen of a business and to use those
39		alcoholic beverages for culinary purposes. The permit may be issued
40		for either of the following:
41		a. Restaurants;
42		b. Hotels.
43		c. Cooking schools.

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- A culinary permit may also be issued to a catering service to allow the 1 2 possession of the amount of fortified wine and spirituous liquor stated 3 4 5 6 7 (12)8 9 10 at the event. 11 12 (13)13 14 15 16 17 18 19 20 21 22 23 24
  - above at the business location of that service and at the cooking site. The permit shall also authorize the caterer to transport those alcoholic beverages to and from the business location and the cooking site, and use them in cooking.
  - Mixed Beverages Catering Permit. A mixed beverages catering permit authorizes a hotel or a restaurant that has a mixed beverages permit to bring spirituous liquor onto the premises where the hotel or restaurant is catering food for an event and to serve the liquor to guests
  - Guest Room Cabinet Permit. A guest room cabinet permit authorizes a hotel having a mixed beverages permit to sell to its room guests, from securely locked cabinets, malt beverages, unfortified wine, fortified wine, and spirituous liquor. A permittee shall designate and maintain at least ten percent (10%) of the permittee's guest rooms as rooms that do not have a guest room cabinet. A permittee may dispense alcoholic beverages from a guest room cabinet only in accordance with written policies and procedures filed with and approved by the Commission. A permittee shall provide a reasonable number of vending machines, coolers, or similar machines on premises for the sale of soft drinks to hotel guests.

A guest room cabinet permit may be issued for any of the following:

- A hotel located in a county subject to G.S. 18B-600(f). a.
- b. A hotel located in a county that has a population in excess of 150,000 by the last federal census."

Sec. 6. G.S. 18B-1115(a) reads as rewritten:

- Permit Required. Unless a person holds a permit which otherwise allows him to transport more than 80 liters of malt beverages other than draft malt beverages in kegs, 20 liters of unfortified wine, or five eight liters of fortified wine or spirituous liquor, or is a retailer authorized to transport alcoholic beverages under G.S. 18B-405, each person transporting alcoholic beverages in excess of those quantities shall have the permit described in this section."
  - Sec. 7. This act becomes effective July 1, 1993.
