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1	(1) Be paid at the salary level set by Section 56(a) of Chapter 321 of the
2	1993 Session Laws; and
3	(2) <u>Annually receive the payment set by Section 69 of Chapter 321 of the</u>
4	<u>1993 Session Laws if such payment was received by that officer</u>
5	during the 1993-94 fiscal year.
6 7	Such election shall be made on a form provided by the Administrative Officer of the Courts and filed with the Administrative Officer of the Courts on or before May 1,
8	<u>1994.</u> Any election applies to both subdivisions of this subsection. It is the intent of the
9	General Assembly that if any across-the-board cost-of-living salary increases are
10	granted for the 1994-95 fiscal year, those increases shall be applied to the salary
11	schedule provided by subsection (a) of this section, but not to the salary schedule
12	provided by Section 56 of Chapter 321 of the 1993 Session Laws, except for persons not
13	covered by subsection (a) of this section (Assistant District Attorneys, Assistant Public
14	Defenders, Administrative Officer of the Courts, and Assistant Administrative Officer
15	of the Courts). It is the intent of the General Assembly that if any across-the-board
16	cost-of-living salary increases are granted for the 1995-96 or later fiscal years, those
17	increases shall be applied to the salary schedule provided by Section 56 of Chapter 321
18	of the 1993 Session Laws.
19	(c) The election made under subsection (c) of this section applies only if the
20	officer continues in the same office, provided that a change of:
21	(1) Justice of the Supreme Court to Chief Justice of the Supreme Court; (2) Justice of the Court of America to Chief Justice of the Supreme Court;
22	(2) Judge of the Court of Appeals to Chief Judge of that Court; (2) Superior Court Judge to Serier Devident Superior Court Judge and
23 24	 (3) Superior Court Judge to Senior Resident Superior Court Judge; and (4) District Court Judge to Chief District Court Judge
24 25	is considered to be continuance in the same office for the purpose of the election, and
26	shall entitle the person to the higher salary for that office under Section 56 of Chapter
27	<u>321 of the 1993 Session Laws.</u> "
28	Sec. 3. G.S. 7A-10(b) reads as rewritten:
29	"(b) The Chief Justice and each of the associate justices shall receive the annual
30	salary provided in Current Operations Appropriations Act. G.S. 7A-4.30. Each justice is
31	entitled to reimbursement for travel and subsistence expenses at the rate allowed State
32	employees generally."
33	Sec. 4. G.S. 7A-18(a) reads as rewritten:
34	"(a) The Chief Judge and each associate judge of the Court of Appeals shall
35	receive the annual salary provided in the Current Operations Appropriations Act. <u>G.S.</u>
36	7A-4.30. Each judge is entitled to reimbursement for travel and subsistence expenses at
37 38	the rate allowed State employees generally." Sec. 5. G.S. 7A-44(a) reads as rewritten:
38 39	"(a) A judge of the superior court, regular or special, shall receive the annual
40	salary set forth in the Current Operations Appropriations Act, and in addition shall be
41	paid the same travel allowance as State employees generally by G.S. 138-6(a)(1) and
42	(2), provided that no travel allowance be paid for travel within his county of residence.
43	<u>G.S. 7A-4.30.</u> In addition, a judge of the superior court shall be allowed seven thousand
44	dollars (\$7,000) per year, payable monthly, in lieu of necessary subsistence expenses

1	while attending court or transacting official business at a place other than in the county
2	of his residence receive:
3	(1) <u>Travel reimbursement for actual expenses for meals and lodging out of</u>
4	the county of residence, but not to exceed the daily rate members of
5	the General Assembly receive under G.S. 120-3.1(a)(3); and
6	(2) <u>Mileage for travel from place of residence to the place of holding court</u>
7	at the business standard mileage rate set by the Internal Revenue
8	Service per mile of travel, which is the same rate as is provided for
9	State employees
10	for any day that judge is assigned to hold court in a location other than the judge's
11	county of residence, and in lieu of other professional expenses incurred in the discharge
12	of his official duties. The Administrative Officer of the Courts may also reimburse
13	superior court judges, in addition to the above funds for travel and subsistence, for
14	travel and subsistence expenses incurred for professional education.
15	Any judge of the superior court who has elected under G.S. 7A-4.30 to continue
16	under the old pay schedule may, on the same form, elect to receive, in lieu of the
17	reimbursement and mileage set out in subdivisions (1) and (2) of this subsection, seven
18	thousand dollars (\$7,000) per year, payable monthly, in lieu of necessary subsistence
19	expenses while attending court or transacting official business at a place other than in
20	the county of his residence and in addition shall be paid the same travel allowance as
21	State employees generally by G.S. 138-6(a)(1) and (2), provided that no travel
22	allowance be paid for travel within his county of residence."
23	Sec. 6. G.S. 7A-65(a) reads as rewritten:
24	"(a) The annual salary of district attorneys and shall be as provided by G.S. 7A-
25	4.30. The annual salary of full-time assistant district attorneys shall be as provided in
26	the Current Operations Appropriations Act. When traveling on official business, each
27	district attorney and assistant district attorney is entitled to reimbursement for his
28	subsistence and travel expenses to the same extent as State employees generally."
29	Sec. 7. G.S. 7A-101(a) reads as rewritten:
30	"(a) The clerk of superior court is a full-time employee of the State and shall
31	receive an annual salary, payable in equal monthly installments, based on the population
32	of the county as determined in subsection (a1) of this section, according to the following
33	schedule: schedule set out in G.S. 7A-4.30.
34	Population Annual Salary
35	Less than 100,000 \$48,391
36	100,000 to 149,999 -54,621
37	150,000 to 249,999 62,247
38	250,000 and above 68,256 .
39	When a county changes from one population group to another, the salary of the clerk
40	shall be changed, on July 1 of the fiscal year for which the change is reported, to the
41	salary appropriate for the new population group, except that the salary of an incumbent
42	clerk shall not be decreased by any change in population group during his continuance
43	in office."
44	Sec. 8. G.S. 7A-144(a) reads as rewritten:

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1 "(a) Each judge shall receive the annual salary provided in the Current Operations 2 Appropriations Act, <u>G.S. 7A-4.30</u>, and reimbursement on the same basis as State 3 employees generally, for his necessary travel and subsistence expenses."

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Sec. 9. G.S. 7A-465(b) reads as rewritten:

5 "(b) The public defender shall be an attorney licensed to practice law in North 6 Carolina, and shall devote his full time to the duties of his office. <u>A public defender</u> 7 <u>shall receive the salary provided by G.S. 7A-4.30.</u>

8 In lieu of merit and other increment raises paid to regular State employees, a public 9 defender shall receive as longevity pay an amount equal to four and eight-tenths percent 10 (4.8%) of the annual salary set forth in the Current Operations Appropriations Act 11 payable monthly after five years of service, nine and six-tenths percent (9.6%) after 10 12 years of service, fourteen and four-tenths percent (14.4%) after 15 years of service, and 13 nineteen and two-tenths percent (19.2%) after 20 years of service. 'Service' means 14 service as a public defender."

15 Sec. 10. This act becomes effective July 1, 1994.

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
