A JOINT RESOLUTION SUPPORTING THE REPUBLIC OF CHINA ON TAIWAN'S PARTICIPATION IN THE UNITED NATIONS AND OTHER INTERNATIONAL FORUMS SUCH AS MULTILATERAL TRADE ASSOCIATIONS AND HUMANITARIAN RELIEF ORGANIZATIONS.

Whereas, while the People's Republic of China has been allowed participation in the United Nations, the Republic of China has been denied representation; and

Whereas, there are precedents in place in the United Nations for parallel representation of divided countries; and

Whereas, the Republic of China on Taiwan deserves representation in the United Nations and in other international forums such as multilateral trade associations and humanitarian relief organizations as the People's Republic of China; and

Whereas, in recent years, the Republic of China on Taiwan has had a substantial increase in its foreign trade, and advances in its industrial technology have enabled the Republic of China on Taiwan to become one of the emerging industrial countries; and

Whereas, a democratic, multiparty political system has been smoothly established in the Republic of China on Taiwan in recent years; and

Whereas, the direct role of the Republic of China on Taiwan in international development programs and humanitarian relief operations has expanded significantly during the past decade, often in close coordination with our nation's own such efforts; and

Whereas, the Republic of China on Taiwan's 21 million people deserve the right to participate in international political, economic, and cultural activities;

Now, therefore, be it resolved by the House of Representatives, the Senate concurring:
Section 1. The General Assembly strongly believes that the record of the
Republic of China on Taiwan, concerning its democratization at home and its
humanitarian service abroad should be accorded appropriate recognition by the people
of this State; and that due consideration should be given by the United States to the
readiness of the Republic of China on Taiwan for the latter's further contributions to and
broader participation in the international community, including forums such as

multilateral trade associations, humanitarian relief organizations, and the United 8 9 Nations. 10 Sec. 2. The Secretary of State shall transmit a copy of this resolution to the

Secretary General of the United Nations and to the appropriate representative of the Republic of China on Taiwan. 12

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Sec. 3. This resolution is effective upon ratification.
