Section 1. G.S. 15A-1340.20 is amended by adding a new subsection to read:

- "(c1) Active Punishment Exception. The court may impose an active punishment for a class of offense and prior conviction level that does not otherwise authorize the imposition of an active punishment if the term of imprisonment is equal to or less than the total amount of time the offender has already spent committed to or in confinement in any State or local correctional, mental, or other institution as a result of the charge that culminated in the sentence."
 - Sec. 2. G.S. 20-28 is amended by adding a new subsection to read:
- "(a2) <u>Driving While License Revoked for Failure to Appear or Pay Fine, Penalty, or Costs. If a person's license is revoked solely pursuant to G.S. 20-24.1 and that person is convicted of the offense of driving while license revoked, the court may, upon proof of</u>

satisfaction of	f the cond	<u>litions in</u>	G.S.	20-24.1(t) for	the	original	offense,	order	that	the
Division not revoke the license or that the Division restore the license."											

Sec. 3. G.S. 20-28.1 is amended by adding a new subsection to read:

- "(e) If a person's license is revoked solely pursuant to G.S. 20-24.1 and that person is convicted of the offense of driving while license revoked, the court may, upon proof of satisfaction of the conditions in G.S. 20-24.1(b) for the original offense, order that the Division not revoke the license for an additional period under this section or that the Division restore the license."
- Sec. 4. This act becomes effective December 1, 1996.
