A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

AN ACT TO INCREASE THE PENALTY FOR SPEEDING TO ELUDE ARREST AND TO PROVIDE THAT THERE IS A PRESUMPTION THAT A PERSON IS ELUDING ARREST IF THE PERSON CONTINUES THE SPEEDING VIOLATION FOR A DISTANCE THAT IS A QUARTER OF A MILE OR MORE. The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

Section 1. G.S. 20-141(j) reads as rewritten:

- "(j) A person who does one of the following while fleeing or attempting to elude arrest or apprehension by a law enforcement officer with authority to enforce the motor vehicle laws is guilty of a Class 1 misdemeanor: H felony, and at a minimum shall be punished by a fine of at least five hundred dollars (\$500.00):
 - (1) Drives a vehicle on a street or highway in excess of 55 miles per hour and more than 15 miles per hour over the legal limit.
 - (2) Drives a vehicle in excess of 80 miles per hour.

Section 2. This act becomes effective December 1, 1997, and applies to offenses committed on or after that date.
