A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

2 AN ACT TO APPROPRIATE FUNDS TO ESTABLISH A LITERACY-BASED
3 PRESCHOOL GRANT PROGRAM TO PREPARE AT-RISK STUDENTS FOR
4 KINDERGARTEN.

5 The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

Section 1. (a) There is appropriated from the General Fund to State Aid to 6 Local School Administrative Units the sum of sixty-three million six hundred thousand 7 dollars (\$63,600,000) for the 1999-2000 fiscal year and the sum of sixty-three million six 8 hundred thousand dollars (\$63,600,000) for the 2000-2001 fiscal year to establish a 9 literacy-based preschool grant program to prepare at-risk students for kindergarten. The 10 State Board of Education shall distribute these funds on a grant basis to local school 11 administrative units that match State funds on a dollar-for-dollar basis by committing 12 federal funds received under Title I of the Improving America's Schools Act, Smart Start 13 14 funds, and other non-State funds to the program.

15 (b) Local boards of education shall use these funds to establish a program 16 similar to the Bright Beginnings Program in Mecklenburg County. The purpose of the 17 program shall be to assist four-year-olds who might otherwise begin kindergarten already 18 behind their peers to build the literacy-based foundation that they will need to succeed 19 when they begin kindergarten.

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1 Students who participate in the program shall be identified according to their 2 educational need. The local board of education shall collaborate with other local 3 agencies in recruiting children for the program.

4 The program shall last at least six hours a day. Each classroom shall have a 5 teacher and a teacher's assistant. Teachers shall receive extensive staff development for 6 the program.

The curriculum shall be child-centered, with a strong focus on language 7 8 development and emergent literacy. The curriculum shall be aligned with the local K-3 9 curriculum.

10 Parental involvement shall be a requirement of the program. Parents of participating children must agree to ensure regular attendance by their children, adult 11 12 supervision at the bus stop before and after school, current immunizations, parental attendance at a program orientation session and at parent-teacher conferences, parental 13 14 participation in at least four school events, regular reading and other literacy activities at 15 home, parental participation in a minimum of five hours of family-school partnership workshops, ongoing communications with their children's teachers, and community 16 17 participation and collaboration. 18

Section 2. This act becomes effective July 1, 1999.
