6	SECTION 1. G.S. 163-226 reads as rewritten:			
7	"§ 163-226. Who may vote an absentee ballot.			
8	(a) Who May Vote Absentee Ballot; Generally. – Any qualified voter of the State			
9	may vote by absentee ballot in a statewide primary, general, or special election on			
10	constitutional amendments, referenda or bond proposals, and any qualified voter of a			
11	county is authorized to vote by absentee ballot in any primary or election conducted by			
12	the county board of elections, in the manner provided in this Article if:			
13	(1) The voter expects to be absent from the county in which he is			
14	registered during the entire period that the polls are open on the day of			
15	the specified election in which the voter desires to vote;			
16	(2) The voter is unable to be present at the voting place to vote in person			
17	on the day of the specified election in which the voter desires to vote			
18	because of the voter's sickness or other physical disability;			
19	(3) The voter is incarcerated, whether in the voter's county of residence or			
20	elsewhere, shall be entitled to vote by absentee ballot in the county of			
21	the voter's residence in any election, specified herein, in which the			
22	voter otherwise would be entitled to vote. Absentee voting shall be in
