2	AN ACT TO ESTABLISH A VACCINATION PROGRAM FOR FIRST		
3	RESPONDERS TO TERRORIST INCIDENTS, CATASTROPHIC OR NATURAL		
4	DISASTERS, OR EMERGENCIES.		
5	The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:		
6	SECTION 1. Article 22 of Chapter 130A of the General Statutes is amended		
7	by adding the following new section to read:		
8	8 "§ 130A-485. Vaccination program established; definitions.		
9	(a) The Department and local health departments shall offer a vaccination		
10	program for first responders who may be exposed to infectious diseases when deployed		
11	to disaster locations. The vaccinations shall include, but are not limited to, hepatitis A		
12	vaccination, hepatitis B vaccination, diphtheria-tetanus vaccination, influenza		
13	vaccination, pneumococcal vaccination, and other vaccinations when recommended by		
14	the United States Public Health Service and in accordance with Federal Emergency		
15	Management Directors Policy. Immune globulin will be made available when		
16	necessary, as determined by the State Health Director.		
17	(b) Participation in the vaccination program is voluntary by the first responders,		
18			
19	bloodborne pathogens as defined by the Occupational Safety and Health Administration		
20	Standard contained at 29 C.F.R. § 1910.10300 who shall be required to take the		
21	designated vaccinations or otherwise required by law.		
22	(c) Nothing in this section shall require first responders, except first responders		
23	for whom the vaccination program is not voluntary as set forth in subsection (b) of this		
24	section, who present a written statement from a licensed physician indicating that a		
25	vaccine is medically contraindicated for the first responder or who sign a written		
26	statement that the administration of a vaccination conflicts with the first responder's		
27	religious tenets, to receive a vaccine.		

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1	(d) In t	he event of a vaccine shortage, the State Public Health Director, in		
2	consultation with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, shall give priority for			
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4		Department shall notify first responders of the availability of the		
5		rogram and shall provide educational materials on ways to prevent

7	<u>(f)</u> <u>As</u>	used in this section, unless the context clearly requires otherwise, the		
8	term:			
9	<u>(1)</u>	'Bioterrorism' means the intentional use of any microorganism, virus,		
10		infectious substance, biological product, or biological agent as defined		
11		in G.S. 130A-479 that may be engineered as a result of biotechnology		
12		or any naturally occurring or bioengineered component of any		
13		microorganism, virus, infectious substance, or biological product to		
14		cause or attempt to cause death, disease, or other biological		
15		malfunction in any living organism.		
16	<u>(2)</u>	'Disaster location' means any geographical location where a		
17		bioterrorism attack, terrorist incident, catastrophic or natural disaster,		
18		or emergency occurs.		
19	<u>(3)</u>	'First responders' means State and local law enforcement personnel,		
20		fire department personnel, and emergency medical personnel who will		
21		be deployed to bioterrorism attacks, terrorist attacks, catastrophic or		
22		natural disasters, or emergencies."		
23		CTION 2. Nothing in this act obligates the General Assembly to		
24	** *	ate funds for the implementation of this act. The Department of Health		
25	and Human Services shall work with local employers to access, when available, federal			
26	·	ment a vaccination program for first responders as enacted in Section 1 of		
27	this act.			
28	SEC	CTION 3. This act is effective when it becomes law.
