2	AN ACT TO ENHANCE THE CAPACITY OF PRIVATE INSTITUTIONS OF
3	HIGHER EDUCATION TO PROTECT THE SAFETY AND WELFARE OF
4	THEIR STUDENTS, FACULTY, AND STAFF BY ENACTING THE CAMPUS
5	POLICE ACT.
6	The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:
7	<b>SECTION 1.</b> The General Statutes are amended by adding a new Chapter to
8	read:
9	" <u>Chapter 74G.</u>
10	"Campus Police Act.
11	"§ 74G-1. Title.
12	This Chapter is the "Campus Police Act" and may be cited by that name.
13	"§ 74G-2. Policy and scope.
14	(a) <u>The purpose of this Chapter is to protect the safety and welfare of students</u> ,
15	faculty, and staff in institutions of higher education by fostering integrity, proficiency,
16	and competence among campus police agencies and campus police officers. To achieve
17	this purpose, the General Assembly finds that a Campus Police Program needs to be
18	established. As part of the Campus Police Program, the Attorney General is given the
19	authority to certify a private, nonprofit institution of higher education, other than those
20	described by G.S. 116-15(d), as a campus police agency and to commission an
21	individual as a campus police officer.
22	(b) The purpose of this Chapter is also to assure, to the extent consistent with the
23	State and federal constitutions, that this protection is not denied to students, faculty, and
24	staff at private, nonprofit institutions of higher education originally established by or
25	affiliated with religious denominations. To achieve this purpose, the General Assembly
26	finds that:
27	(1) Most of the State's private, nonprofit institutions of higher education
28	were originally established by or affiliated with religious
29	denominations;

1	<u>(2)</u>	These institutions have made and continue to make significant
2		contributions in education to the State and the nation;
3	<u>(3)</u>	These institutions admit students regardless of their spiritual or
4		religious beliefs;
5	<u>(4)</u>	These institutions' principal mission is educational;
6	<u>(5)</u>	All of these institutions are accredited by the Commission on Colleges
7		of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools and as such have
8		independent governing boards of trustees;
9	<u>(6)</u>	The principal State power conferred on campus police by this Chapter
10		is the power of arrest;
11	<u>(7)</u>	This power is important to protect the safety and welfare of students,
12		faculty, and staff at these institutions;
13	<u>(8)</u>	In exercising the power of arrest, these officers apply standards
14		established by State and federal law only; and
15	<u>(9)</u>	The exercise of this power is reviewable by the General Court of
16		Justice and the federal courts.

28		officers into any or all of the municipality's jurisdiction and to
29		determine the circumstances in which this extension of authority may
30		be granted;
31	<u>(2)</u>	Enter into joint agreements with the governing board of any county
32		and, with the consent of the sheriff, to extend the law enforcement
33		authority of campus police officers into any or all of the county's
34		jurisdiction and to determine the circumstances in which this extension
35		of authority may be granted; and
36	<u>(3)</u>	Enter into joint agreements with the governing board of any other
37		public or private educational institution that has a campus police
38		agency pursuant to this Chapter or pursuant to G.S. 116-40.5 to extend
39		the law enforcement authority of its campus police officers into any or

5	Carolina may elect to have its officers certified under Chapter 17C and Chapter 116 of
6	the General Statutes, and the board of trustees of any community college may elect to
7	have its officers certified under Chapter 17C and Chapter 115D of the General Statutes
8	rather than requesting certification as a campus police agency and campus police
9	commission pursuant to the provisions of this Chapter.
10	(f) Exclusive Authority. – Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the
11	authority granted to campus police officers certified under this Chapter shall be limited
12	to the provisions of this Chapter.
13	" <u>§ 74G-7. Badges, uniforms, weapons, and vehicles.</u>
14	Campus police agencies shall be responsible for ensuring that all employees,
15	whether or not commissioned, comply with the provisions of this Chapter and the rules
16	adopted under this Chapter, including those provisions pertaining to the wearing of
17	badges and uniforms, the carrying of weapons, and the operation of vehicles.
18	" <u>§ 74G-8. Minimum standards for campus police officers.</u>
19	Applicants for commission as a campus police officer and a commissioned campus
20	police officer must meet and maintain the same minimum preemployment and
21	in-service standards as are required for State law enforcement officers by the North
22	Carolina Criminal Justice Education and Training Standards Commission and must
23	meet and maintain any other preemployment and in-service requirements set by the
24	Attorney General.
25	" <u>§ 74G-9. Compensation of campus police officers.</u>
26	The compensation of a campus police officer shall be paid by the campus police
27	agency for which the officer is commissioned, as may be agreed on between them.
28	"§ 74G-10. Expiration, renewal, and termination of agency certification or officer
29	commission.
30	(a) Agency. – Unless sooner suspended or revoked by the Attorney General, a
31	campus police agency's certification expires on June 30 of the calendar year following
32	the date it is issued. A campus police agency may renew the certification upon payment
33	of the appropriate fee and compliance with this Chapter and the rules adopted under this
34	Chapter. An entity whose campus police agency's certification was denied or revoked
35	for a violation of this Chapter or a rule adopted under this Chapter is not eligible to
36	apply again for that certification for three years.
37	(b) Officer. – Unless sooner suspended or revoked by the Attorney General, a
38	campus police officer's commission expires on June 30 of the calendar year following
39	the date it is issued. A campus police officer may renew a commission upon payment of
40	the appropriate fee and compliance with this Chapter and the rules adopted under this
41	Chapter. The Attorney General shall immediately revoke the commission of a campus
42	police officer when any of the following occurs:
43	(1) <u>Termination of employment with the campus police agency for which</u>
44	the officer is commissioned.

A company police agency may apply to the Attorney General to commission an 11 individual designated by the agency to act as a company police officer for the agency." 12 SECTION 3. G.S. 74E-6 reads as rewritten: 13 "§ 74E-6. Oaths, powers, and authority of company police officers. 14 (a) Requirements. - An individual who is commissioned as a company police 15 officer must take the oath of office required of a law enforcement officer before the individual assumes the duties of a company police officer. The person in each company 16 17 police agency who is responsible for the agency's company police officers must be 18 commissioned as a company police officer. Categories. - The following three distinct classifications of company police 19 (b)officers are established: 20 21 (1) Campus Police Officers – <u>Only Those those company police officers</u> who are employed by any college or university that is a constituent 22 23 institution of The University of North Carolina or any private college 24 or university that is licensed or exempted from licensure as prescribed by G.S. 116-15.G.S. 116-15, and who are employed by a campus 25 police agency that was licensed pursuant to this Chapter prior to the 26 27 enactment of Chapter 74G of the General Statutes. Railroad Police Officers - Those company police officers who are 28 (2)employed by a certified rail carrier and commissioned as company 29 police officers under this Chapter. 30 Special Police Officers - All company police officers not designated 31 (3) 32 as a campus police officer or railroad police officer. 33 All Company Police. - Company police officers, while in the performance of (c) their duties of employment, have the same powers as municipal and county police 34 35 officers to make arrests for both felonies and misdemeanors and to charge for infractions on any of the following: 36 37 Real property owned by or in the possession and control of their (1)38 employer. 39 Real property owned by or in the possession and control of a person (2)who has contracted with the employer to provide on-site company 40 police security personnel services for the property. 41 42 (3) Any other real property while in continuous and immediate pursuit of a 43 person for an offense committed upon property described in subdivisions (1) or (2) of this subsection. 44

Company police officers shall have, if duly authorized by the superior officer in charge, 1 2 the authority to carry concealed weapons pursuant to and in conformity with 3 G.S. 14-269(b)(5). 4 (d) Campus Police. - Campus police officers have the powers contained in 5 subsection (c) of this section and also have the powers in that subsection upon that 6 portion of any public road or highway passing through or immediately adjoining the property described in that subsection, wherever located. The board of trustees of any 7 8 college or university that qualifies as a campus police agency pursuant to this Chapter 9 may enter into a mutual aid agreement with the governing board of a municipality or, 10 with the consent of the county sheriff, a county to the same extent as a municipal police department pursuant to Chapter 160A. 11 12 (e) Railroad Police. - Railroad police officers have the powers contained in 13 subsection (c) and also have the powers and authority granted by federal law or by a 14 regulation promulgated by the United States Secretary of Transportation. 15 Notwithstanding any of the provisions of this Chapter, the limitations on the power to 16 make arrests contained in subsection (c) above, shall not be applicable to railroad police 17 officers commissioned by the Attorney General pursuant to the authority of this 18 Chapter. 19 (f)Campus Option. Notwithstanding any of the provisions of this Chapter, the 20 Board of Trustees of any constituent institution of The University of North Carolina 21 may elect to have its officers certified under Chapter 17C and Chapter 116 of the General Statutes and the board of trustees of any community college may elect to have 22 23 its officers certified under Chapter 17C and Chapter 115D of the General Statutes rather 24 than requesting certification as a company police agency and company police commission pursuant to the provisions of this Chapter. 25 Exclusive Authority. - Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the 26 (g) 27 authority granted to company police officers shall be limited to the provisions of this Chapter." 28 29 SECTION 4. G.S. 14-415.10(4) reads as rewritten: Oualified former sworn law enforcement officer. – An individual who 30 "(4) retired from service as a law enforcement officer with a local, State, 31 32 campus police, or company police agency in North Carolina, other 33 than for reasons of mental disability, who has been retired as a sworn 34 law enforcement officer two years or less from the date of the permit 35 application, and who satisfies all of the following: 36

- a. Immediately before retirement, the individual was a qualified law enforcement officer with a local, State, or company police agency in North Carolina.
- 39b.The individual has a nonforfeitable right to benefits under the40retirement plan of the local, State, or company police agency as41a law enforcement officer or has 20 or more aggregate years of42law enforcement service and has retired from a company police43agency that does not have a retirement plan.

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1	c. The individual is not prohibited by State or federal law from
2	receiving a firearm."
3	<b>SECTION 5.</b> G.S. 14-415.10(5) reads as rewritten:
4	"(5) Qualified sworn law enforcement officer. – A law enforcement officer
5	employed by a local, State, <u>campus police</u> , or company police agency
6	in North Carolina who satisfies all of the following:
7	a. The individual is authorized by the agency to carry a handgun
8	in the course of duty.
9	b. The individual is not the subject of a disciplinary action by the
10	agency that prevents the carrying of a handgun.
11	c. The individual meets the requirements established by the
12	agency regarding handguns."
13	<b>SECTION 6.</b> When this act becomes law, all certificates issued to police
14	agencies at private institutions of higher education and commissions issued to their
15	police officers pursuant to Chapter 74E of the General Statutes shall automatically
16	convert to certification and commissions issued pursuant to this act and shall be
17	administered in conformity with this act. Notwithstanding any of the provisions of
18	Chapter 74G of the General Statutes, as enacted by this act, or the provisions of Chapter
19	74E of the General Statutes, the board of trustees of any educational institution that, on
20	the effective date of this act, has a company police agency licensed pursuant to Chapter
21	74E of the General Statutes, may elect to continue to have its officers certified under
