## A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

2 AN ACT TO APPROPRIATE FUNDS FOR COMMUNITY HEALTH GRANTS.

3 The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

4 **SECTION 1.(a)** There is appropriated from the General Fund to the 5 Department of Health and Human Services, Division of Public Health, the sum of eleven million dollars (\$11,000,000) for the 2005-2006 fiscal year. Of these funds, the 6 7 sum of six million dollars (\$6,000,000) shall be used for federally qualified health 8 centers and for those health centers that meet the criteria for federally qualified health 9 centers, and the sum of five million dollars (\$5,000,000) shall be used for 10 State-designated rural health centers and public health departments and other nonprofit 11 health care organizations with a mission to serve the uninsured and other medically 12 underserved populations. Funds shall be used to:

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- (1) Increase access to preventative and primary care services by uninsured or medically indigent patients in existing or new health center locations:
- 16 (2) Establish community health center services in counties where no such services exist;
- 18 (3) Create new services or augment existing services provided to
  19 uninsured or medically indigent patients, including primary care and
  20 preventative medical services, dental services, pharmacy, and
  21 behavioral health;
  22 (4) Increase capacity necessary to serve the uninsured by enhancing or
  - (4) Increase capacity necessary to serve the uninsured by enhancing or replacing facilities, equipment, or technologies;
- (5) Expand the Medical Access Program of the Office of Research,
  Demonstrations, and Rural Health Development to safety net providers
  who currently receive no financial support for indigent care and who
  are located in high-needs counties; and

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1 2 3 (6) Create or augment community collaborations or integrated delivery systems that have the capacity to expand health services to the uninsured or medically indigent patients.

4 Of the five million dollars (\$5,000,000) allocated under this section to 5 State-designated rural health centers, public health departments, and other nonprofit 6 health care organizations, the sum of one hundred forty thousand dollars (\$140,000) 7 shall be allocated to the Office of Research, Demonstrations, and Rural Health Development to develop planning packages for local communities interested in 8 9 developing safety net programs, to provide technical assistance, and collect data on the capacity of the existing safety net to meet the needs of the uninsured and medically 10 11 underserved.

Grant funds may not be used to enhance or increase compensation or other benefits of personnel, administrators, directors, consultants, or any other parties. Grant funds may not be used to supplant federal funds traditionally received by federally qualified community health centers and may not be used to finance or satisfy any existing debt.

**SECTION 1.(b)** The Office shall work with the North Carolina Community Health Center Association (hereafter "NCCHCA") and the North Carolina Public Health Association (hereafter "NCPHA") to establish an advisory committee to develop an objective and equitable process for awarding grant funds. The Office shall also develop auditing and accountability procedures. Not more than one percent (1%) of the funds appropriated in this section may be used to reimburse the Office for administering the grant program in collaboration with the NCCHCA and the NCPHA.

SECTION 1.(c) Recipients of grant funds shall provide to the Office annually a written report detailing the number of additional uninsured and medically indigent patients that are cared for, the types of services that were provided, and any other information requested by the Office as necessary for evaluating the success of the grant program.

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SECTION 2. This act becomes effective July 1, 2005.
