A BILL TO BE ENTITLED AN ACT TO EXPAND THE POWERS OF THE DEPARTMENT OF CRIME CONTROL AND PUBLIC SAFETY, DIVISION OF EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT, AS RECOMMENDED BY THE JOINT SELECT COMMITTEE ON EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS AND DISASTER MANAGEMENT RECOVERY.

The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

SECTION 1. G.S. 166A-4(4) reads as rewritten:

Emergency Management. - Those measures taken by the populace and governments at federal, State, and local levels to minimize the adverse effect of any type disaster, which includes the never-ending preparedness cycle of planning, prevention, mitigation, warning, movement, shelter, emergency assistance, and recovery."

SECTION 2. G.S. 166A-4 is amended by adding a new subdivision to read:

"(5a) Hazard Risk Management. – The systematic application of policies, practices, and resources to the identification, assessment, and control of risk associated with hazards affecting human health and safety and property. Hazard, risk, and cost-benefit analysis are used to support development of risk reduction options, program objectives, and prioritization of issues and resources."

SECTION 3. G.S. 166A-5(3) reads as rewritten:

- Functions of State Emergency Management. The functions of the State emergency management program include:
 - Coordination of the activities of all agencies for emergency management within the State, including planning, organizing, staffing, equipping, training, testing, and the activation of emergency management programs.
 - Preparation and maintenance of State plans for man-made or natural b. disasters. The State plans or any parts thereof may be incorporated into department regulations and into executive orders of the Governor.
 - b1. Coordination with the State Health Director to amend or revise the North Carolina Emergency Operations Plan regarding public health matters. At a minimum, the revisions to the Plan shall provide for the following:
 - The epidemiologic investigation of a known or suspected 1. threat caused by nuclear, biological, or chemical agents.



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The examination and testing of persons and animals that may 1 2 have been exposed to a nuclear, biological, or chemical agent. 3 The procurement and allocation of immunizing agents and 4 prophylactic antibiotics. 5 The allocation of the National Pharmaceutical Stockpile. 6 The appropriate conditions for quarantine and isolation in 7 order to prevent further transmission of disease. 8 Immunization procedures. 9 The issuance of guidelines for prophylaxis and treatment of 10 exposed and affected persons. Promulgation of standards and requirements for local plans and 11 programs, determination of eligibility for State financial assistance 12 13 provided for in G.S. 166A-7 and provision of technical assistance to 14 Development and presentation of training programs and public 15 information programs to insure the furnishing of adequately trained 16 17 personnel and an informed public in time of need. 18 Making of such studies and surveys of the resources in this State as 19 may be necessary to ascertain the capabilities of the State for 20 emergency management, maintaining data on these resources, and 21 planning for the most efficient use thereof. 22 Coordination of the use of any private facilities, services, and 23 24 Preparation for issuance by the Governor of executive orders, g. 25 proclamations, and regulations as necessary or appropriate. 26 Cooperation and maintenance of liaison with the other states, federal h. 27 government and any public or private agency or entity in achieving 28 any purpose of this Article and in implementing programs for 29 emergency, disaster or war prevention, preparation, response, and 30 recovery. 31 i. Making recommendations, as appropriate, for zoning, building and 32 other land-use controls, and safety measures for securing mobile 33 homes or other nonpermanent or semipermanent works designed to 34 protect against or mitigate the effects of a disaster. 35 Coordination of the use of existing means of communications and j. 36 supplementing communications resources and integrating them into a 37 comprehensive State or State-federal telecommunications or other 38 communications system or network. 39 Administration of federal and State grant funds provided for k. emergency management purposes, including those funds provided for 40 planning and preparedness activities by emergency management 41 42 agencies. 43 <u>l.</u> Serving as the lead State agency for hazard risk management, which 44 shall include the following responsibilities: Coordinating with the supporting State and county 45 <u>1.</u> governments in conducting hazard risk analysis. 46 47 Establishing and maintaining a hazard risk management <u>2.</u> 48 system and tools to display natural hazards and vulnerabilities and conducting risk assessment. 49 50 Acquiring and leveraging all natural hazard data generated or <u>3.</u>
