BILL SUMMARY:

This bill would amend GS 115C-391 to require that signed permission from the student's parent or guardian be on file in the school before corporal punishment is administered to the student. The bill further requires that each local school board report annually to the State Board of Education the number of times that corporal punishment is administered each year according to the student's grade, age, gender, race, and whether the student was receiving special education services.

ASSUMPTIONS AND METHODOLOGY:

There may be a minor fiscal impact on local education agencies (LEAs) related to acquiring and filing permission forms. Per the allotted average daily membership (ADM), there are expected to be 1,464,914 students attending public school in North Carolina. The bill requires that signed permission from the student's parent or guardian be on file in the school before corporal punishment is administered to the student. Costs of producing these forms would vary by school, but if one estimates a cost of 5 cents per form, the initial statewide local cost of implementation would be \$73,246. As this bill does not appropriate additional funds to cover this expense, LEAs

would have to cover the expense through existing resources such as the State allotment for supplies & materials. There may also be some clerical time required for school employees that process the forms, but no additional positions or staffing are projected to be required.

There is no additional fiscal impact related to school board reporting requirements. While there might be some additional clerical time required for school employees to submit such a report, there is no additional fiscal impact. GS 115C-391(a)(4) already requires the LEA to notify the appropriate parent or guardian with notification whenever corporal punishment is administered. LEAs are therefore already creating the data necessary to fulfill the annual reporting requirements that would be mandated by this bill.
