3	VOLUNTEERS OR PAID FIRE DEPARTMENT PERSONNEL AND EMERGENCY
4	MEDICAL SERVICES PERSONNEL AND TO ESTABLISH THE URBAN SEARCH
5	AND RESCUE PROGRAM AND THE URBAN SEARCH AND RESCUE TEAM
6	ADVISORY COMMITTEE.
7	The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:
8	SECTION 1. G.S. 114-19.12 reads as rewritten:
9	"§ 114-19.12. Criminal history record checks of applicants to and current members of fire
10	departments and emergency medical services.
11	(a) Definitions. – The following definitions apply in this section:
12	
13	(3) Current member. – A person who serves in a paid or volunteer position with
14	a fire department or an emergency medical service.
15	(b) When requested by a designated local Homeland Security director director, a local
16	fire chief, chief of a rated fire department, a county fire marshal, or an emergency services
17	director or, director, or when if there is no designated local Homeland Security director, local
18	fire chief, chief of a rated fire department, county fire marshal, or emergency services director,
19	when requested by a local law enforcement agency, the North Carolina Department of Justice
20	may provide to the requesting director, chief, marshal, director, or agency an applicant's or
21	current member's criminal history from the State and National Repositories of Criminal
22	Histories. The local Homeland Security director, local fire chief, marshal, director, or local law
23	enforcement agency shall provide to the North Carolina Department of Justice the fingerprints
24	of the applicant to be checked, any additional information required by the Department of
25	Justice, and a form signed by the applicant to be checked consenting to the check of the
26 27	criminal record and to the use of fingerprints and other identifying information required by the State or National Repositories. The fingerprints of the individual shall be forwarded to the State
27	State or National Repositories. The fingerprints of the individual shall be forwarded to the State Bureau of Investigation for a search of the State criminal history record file, and the State
28 29	Bureau of Investigation shall forward a set of fingerprints to the Federal Bureau of
29 30	Investigation for a national criminal history record check. The local Homeland Security
31	director, local fire chief, county fire marshal, emergency services director, or local law
32	enforcement agency shall keep all information pursuant to this section confidential. The
33	Department of Justice shall charge a reasonable fee for conducting the checks of the criminal
34	history records authorized by this section.

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1 2 3 4	(d) If the applicant's <u>or current member's</u> verified criminal history record check reveals one or more convictions covered under subdivision (a)(2) of this section, then the conviction shall constitute just cause for not selecting the applicant for the position or for dismissing the <u>person-current member</u> from a current position with the local fire department or emergency
5	medical services. The conviction shall not automatically prohibit volunteering or employment;
6	however, the following factors shall be considered by the local Homeland Security director,
7	local fire chief, county fire marshal, emergency services director, or local law enforcement
8 9	agency in determining whether the position shall be denied: <u>denied or the current member</u> dismissed from a current position:
10	(1) The level and seriousness of the crime;
11	<ul><li>(1) The date of the crime;</li></ul>
12	(3) The age of the person at the time of the conviction;
13	(4) The circumstances surrounding the commission of the crime, if known;
14	(5) The nexus between the criminal conduct of the person and the duties of the
15	person;
16	(6) The prison, jail, probation, parole, rehabilitation, and employment records of
17 18	(7) the person since the date the crime was committed; and (7) The subsequent commission by the person of a crime listed in subsection (a)
18 19	(7) The subsequent commission by the person of a crime listed in subsection (a) of this section.
20	(e) The local fire department or emergency medical services may deny the applicant or
21	current member the position or dismiss an applicant <u>or current member</u> who refuses to consent
22	to a criminal history record check or use of fingerprints or other identifying information
23	required by the State or National Repositories of Criminal Histories. This refusal constitutes
24	just cause for the denial of the position or the dismissal from the <u>a current position</u> .
25	
26	(g) For purposes of this section, "local fire chief" shall include only fire chiefs who are
27 28	paid employees of a city; the fire chief of any bona fide fire department certified to the Commissioner of Insurance with at least a Class 9S rating for insurance grading purposes;
28 29	"county fire marshal" shall include only fire marshals who are paid employees of a county; and
30	"emergency services director" shall include only emergency services directors who are paid
31	employees of a city or county."
32	SECTION 2. The Joint Legislative Oversight Committee on Justice and Public
33	Safety shall study the feasibility of having the Department of Insurance, under the direction of
34	the North Carolina Fire and Rescue Commission, to provide the request for the criminal check
35	and any required identifying information to the Department of Justice. The Committee shall
36 37	report its findings to the 2015 General Assembly upon its convening. SECTION 3. G.S. 166A-19.12 reads as rewritten:

#### **General Assembly Of North Carolina** Session 2013 1 The Advisory Committee shall meet on the call of the chair, or at the request of the (b) 2 Secretary, provided that the Committee shall meet no less than once every year. The 3 Department of Public Safety shall provide space for the Advisory Committee to meet. The 4 Department shall also provide the Advisory Committee with necessary support staff and 5 supplies to enable the Committee to carry out its duties in an effective manner. 6 Members of the Advisory Committee shall serve without pay, but shall receive (c) 7 travel allowance, lodging, subsistence, and per diem as provided by G.S. 138-5. 8 The Contract Response Team Advisory Committee shall advise the Secretary on the (d) 9 establishment of the Urban Search and Rescue Program. The Committee shall also evaluate and 10 advise the Secretary of the need for additional contract response teams to serve the State." 11 **SECTION 5.** Prior to implementation of the Urban Search and Rescue Program 12 established by Section 4 of this act, the Department of Public Safety shall study the costs of 13 implementing the program, including the apportionment of costs between State and local 14 government entities. The Department shall report the results of its study to the Joint Legislative 15 Justice and Public Safety Oversight Committee and the Fiscal Research Division on or before 16 January 15, 2015. 17 **SECTION 6.** Section 1 of this act becomes effective January 1, 2015. Section 4 of 18 this act becomes effective July 1, 2014. The remainder of this act is effective when it becomes

19 law.
